Equal Pay Day

Tuesday, April 12, 2022 is commemorated as Equal Pay Day in Ontario. This date symbolizes the number of days women must work in order to make the same average wage as men. Although pay equity is the law in Ontario, women continue to earn 30% less than men on average. This pay gap affects women of all ages and education levels. Black and racialized women, Indigenous women, 2SLGBTQI+ women, and women living with disabilities face the greatest wage disparity. OSSTF/FEESO is a member of, and supports the Equal Pay Coalition (EPC), seeking to end gender pay discrimination and close the gender pay gap through legislation, collective bargaining and social initiatives. OSSTF/FEESO is a member of the Equal Pay Coalition, and as part of this coalition, we continue to urge the Ontario government to make meaningful changes to pay equity legislation and to remove other systemic gender barriers that lead to the wage gap. In 2022, the EPC has five key demands for the provincial government:

- 1. Raise the minimum wage to a living wage
- 2. Mandate permanent paid sick days for workers

- 3. Implement the Pay Transparency Act
- 4. Establish affordable, accessible public childcare with decent wages and work conditions for childcare workers
- 5. Rebuild the economy by funding public services and equipping health, community and social services, and education workers with decent wages and working conditions

On Equal Pay Day, the EPC has organized an All-Party Leaders' Debate on Women's Economic Justice, filmed before an audience in-studio and live streamed across the province. NDP Leader Andrea Horwath, Green Party Leader Mike Schreiner and Liberal Leader Steven Del Duca will participate in the debate. To date, the Premier's office has indicated Doug Ford has an unidentified "scheduling conflict".

We are encouraged to wear red on April 12, 2022 to mark Equal Pay Day, and to protest how unequal pay leaves women "in the red". All members are invited to view the Leaders Debate, from 7:00-9:00 p.m. at https://www.facebook.com/EqualPayON. Provincial Election Readiness

Last weekend (March 25/26), Peter Beens and I attended the Election Readiness conference as part of the CPAC regionals. We had presentations from the Provincial Election organizers of OSSTF/FEESO as well as hearing Eric Grenier of thewrit.ca as the keynote speaker. Eric feels that the cost-of-living will likely be the key issue in the campaign. It is also possible that COVID will surface as an issue, depending on how it goes. The CPC can lose 13 seats and still form a majority government, so it will be an uphill battle for the federation. Their goal is to elect an education-friendly government and official opposition. (I believe they will be glad to settle for the former e) Those attending also heard from the leaders of all the opposition parties. Michael Schreiner of the Green Party was clearly the most passionate speaker. Andrea Horwath did say she would scrap EQAO and Steve Del Duca promised to scrap Bill 124 and Hwy 413. If any of these form government, education interests will be better served. To that end, D22 has endorsed all 3 NDP incumbents in the upcoming campaign — Wayne Gates in Niagara Falls, Jenny Stevens in St. Catharines, and Jeff Burch in Niagara Centre. They are also endorsing Dave Augustyn in Niagara West. So from the local federation the message is vote NDP on June 2. To that end, they are organizing some Meet 'N Greets with the candidates as follows:

Does my car insurance policy cover rental cars?



You've got the keys to your new rental car and are excited to put it in gear to officially mark the start of your vacation. But before you drive off into the sunset, ensure you have the coverage you need. You can then enjoy your vacation with the peace of mind that you're properly protected.

When renting a car there are several insurance options for you to choose from. We'll walk you through each option to help you find the coverage that's right for you and your next trip.

Your current car insurance policy

Your rental car may be covered under your own car insurance policy if you purchased additional liability coverage for damage to vehicles you don't own. This endorsement is called "Legal Liability for Damage to Non-Owned Automobiles" and is often referred to as the "Rental Vehicle Insurance Endorsement" or "OPCF 27". Adding this endorsement to your policy extends your existing coverage so it will cover any rental vehicle in your care. You can add this endorsement to your existing policy for a relatively small fee — especially when compared to the rental car company's daily rates. The Rental Vehicle Insurance Endorsement only provides coverage for vehicles rented in Canada or the United States, so if you're travelling internationally you'll need to look at other coverage options. Talk to your insurance provider before renting a car to make sure your endorsement applies and that you have the coverage you need.

Your credit card

Your credit card may provide some coverage for damage caused to your rental car in the event of a collision. Typically, for this coverage to apply, you will need to charge the full amount of the rental car to your credit card and decline the insurance offered by the rental car company. In most cases, your credit card company will have additional limitations to the coverage offered and to when it applies. Contact your credit card company to learn more about the limitations of the coverage they can provide you on your next trip.

Insurance purchased from the rental car company

The rental company you are renting your car from will offer a collision damage waiver, also known as a loss damage waiver, that will cover damage to the rental car while in your care. This insurance is usually charged as a daily rate, in addition to your daily rental charge. If you buy the collision damage waiver, the responsibility for any damage to the rental car will be transferred from you to the rental car company. However, there are usually exclusions for the type of protection offered and when it applies. Always read the fine print closely to decide if it's right for you and your travel plans.

While car insurance likely isn't a part of vacation planning you're excited about, it's important to know that you have the right coverage. Connect with your insurance provider to learn more about your current car insurance policy and what coverage options are available to you when renting a vehicle.
